Innovative Bookselling

Booksellers all over the country are finding new ways to reach their customers, and we've recently learned of a couple that we find especially inspiring.

First, the Vermont-based Northshire Bookstore has opened a unique holiday "pick-up pop-up" just over the border in Williamstown, MA (pictured above and below). Northshire admirer, the writer and director Stacy Cochran, came up with the idea for a special no-browse bookstore, with customers placing orders online and picking up books at the installation. The storefront has been converted into a sort of bookshop diorama: instead of browsing customers, the space is "peopled" with a collection of painted wooden figures by a local artist. The shop has also been decorated with Victorian furnishings on loan from an antique shop down the street, and a record player spins vinyl that you can buy from the bookstore. It's a sort of hopeful paean to the days when we can all be back browsing together in cozy bookstores.
